Blood donations are crucial to maintaining the health and well-being of patients across the country, and with the need for blood constantly rising, there has never been a better time to give. On Wednesday, November 13, the Red Cross is providing an excellent opportunity to allow those who wish to donate blood. At 9:00AM through 3:00PM in the

Bulmer telecommunications Center (BTC), students and staff are able to schedule an appointment for the donation through the Red Cross website.

To ensure that blood donations are managed efficiently and safely, it's required to schedule an appointment ahead of time. When booking an appointment, there will be two options: Power Red or Blood. These

that need to be taken into account when someone is interested in donating blood. The person must be in good health with a maintained iron level. ALBANY SCHOOL CAMERAS ISSUE 12,000+ SPEEDING TICKETS IN 10 DAYS

DRIVERS FACE STEEP FINES AS NEW SCHOOL ZONE CAMERAS CATCH THOUSANDS OF SPEEDERS

The city of Albany's newly installed school zone speed cameras have issued a stunning 12,000 speeding tickets in just 10 days. Located near school zones, these cameras are active during school hours and have a strict tolerance, drivers going even just over the limit receive a ticket. Each fine is set

at \$50, which adds up fast, considering the volume of tickets issued in this short time.

The speed cameras aim to make school zones safer for students by deterring speeding and raising awareness about speed limits in high-traffic areas. However, some Albany residents feel the cameras are catching too many people unaware, especially since they were recently introduced. As Albany Mayor Kathy Sheehan

pointed out, the city has a responsibility to make school areas safe, and the cameras are a direct response to the increase in reckless driving observed in these zones.

Yet, some drivers feel the strictness of the system is too much and too fast. Critics argue that the city should give more warnings before issuing fines and question if the cameras are more about revenue than safety. According to city officials, however, the cameras are meant to serve as a deterrent, and the fines are just a consequence of drivers failing to follow posted limits.

Albany officials are monitoring public feedback, but with safety as the priority, the cameras are likely here to stay. Whether or not ticket numbers decline in the coming weeks will show how effective these cameras are in achieving their goal of slowing down drivers and protecting students.

RUSSIA ALLEGEDLY PLANNING TO PLANT EXPLOSIVES ON U.S.-BOUND FLIGHTS

FOUR ARRESTED AMIDST DEVICES FOUND ONBOARD A PLANE IN A GERMANY AIRPORT

Western Security Officials have spotted two incendiary devices placed on passenger aircraft from Europe to the U.S., and Russia is the suspected perpetrator. Four people have currently been arrested for the scheme, and an investigation is still pending. The Wall Street Journal was the first to report on this matter, and Polish authorities have taken the suspects into custody.

The incendiary devices were tracked by the DHL while at Leipzig/ Halle airport in Germany, and state that there is no current threat to U.S.bound aircraft. The White House and CIA declined to comment at this time. There were two other incidents in July reported by Britain and Germany that were also suspected to be of a Russian plot. This incident was "to test the transfer channel for such parcels" (NBC). The U.K. counterterrorism police also decline to comment at this time.

Many nations of Europe have recently accused Russia of gressive sabotage campaigns, which is presumed to aim at disrupting Western support to assist Ukraine in the ongoing war. This attempted sabotage was also set to hurt Germany by a plot to 'bomb or set fire to military bases in Germany'.

International spokespeople of Russia have denied these accusations and have claimed that all of the information is fake and that the sabotage



against United States aircraft was 'one of such fakes'. The feud between Russia and NATO continues with the war of Ukraine, and it is possible that Russia is heating up the conflict through these sabotages.

CANCER RATES ON THE RISE WITH YOUNG ADULTS

EXPERTS WARN OF GROWING CANCER INCIDENCE AMONG YOUNG ADULTS, CITING LIFESTYLE AND ENVIRONMENTAL FACTORS

Recent studies reveal that cancer rates are on the rise among young adults, particularly for colorectal and breast cancer, two types traditionally more common in older adults. Data from Cedars-Sinai shows that diagnoses for these cancers in younger age groups have steadily increased over the past few decades, with individuals in their 20s, 30s, and 40s facing higher risks than before.

Experts aren't entirely certain why these rates are rising but believe changes in lifestyle, diet, and environmental factors might contribute. Factors such as processed food consumption, sedentary habits, and rising obesity levels are under scrutiny. Additionally, genetics and family history remain important aspects, with some individuals more susceptible to cancer at younger ages due to inherited genetic factors.



The rise in these cases has led to adjustments in screening recommendations. For example, the American Cancer Society now suggests that individuals begin colorectal cancer screening at 45 instead of 50, in response to the increasing diagnoses in younger adults. Breast cancer screenings are also being reconsidered, with recommendations for early screenings for those with a family history or higher risk factors.

Dr. John Leppert from Cedars-Sinai

explains that "Catching cancer early can be a huge factor in treatment success," adding that, especially with early-onset cancer, "regular checkups and knowing family history are more important than ever." Doctors recommend that young adults stay proactive about their health, report unusual symptoms early, and advocate for screenings if they believe they might

The rise in cancer rates among younger adults is alarming, but there are positive steps that can be taken. Young adults can reduce their risk by making lifestyle changes such as increasing physical activity, eating a balanced diet, and staying on top of regular health screenings. While there's still much to learn, researchers and health professionals are working to understand this trend, offering strategies to help younger populations stay vigilant and informed.

FOUND 'YELLOW BRICK ROAD' AT THE BOTTOM OF THE PACIFIC OCEAN

A recent dive expedition in the Pacific Ocean uncovered something that's sparking a lot of excitement, a rocky formation resembling a yellow brick road at the bottom of the sea. Scientists made this unusual discovery from the

Ocean Exploration Trust, a team led by famed oceanographer Robert Ballard, who's known for exploring the Titanic wreck. They came across the strange

The "yellow brick road" sighting has drawn attention because it genuinely looks like a paved pathway or ancient structure. This phenomenon, however, isn't man-made or connected to Atlantis or Oz, despite the dramatic resemblance. Scientists explained that it's a natural result of volcanic activity, created over thousands or even millions of years by the unique interaction between hot lava and the frigid temperatures of ocean water.

The team believes the "road" is a type of volcanic rock called hyaloclastite, which forms when hot magma erupts from the seafloor and rapidly cools upon contact with cold ocean water, causing the rock to fracture in rectangular and block-like patterns that can resemble bricks. A team member said, "It's the unique interaction of hot magma with cold ocean water that causes fractures," describing how these dramatic cooling processes created this geological illusion.

The Ocean Exploration Trust explained that they hope to learn more about the formation of seamounts (underwater volcanoes) and other geological features in this highly active volcanic area.

BOEING EMPLOYEES AGREE TO A NEW CONTRACT

WHY THE BOEING STRIKE IS COMING TO AN END, AND WHAT IT MEANS FOR THEM

Boeing machinists are heading back to work with a new contract that prom-

ises significant gains after a seven-week-long strike. Members of the Interna tional Association of Machinists and Aerospace Workers (IAM) Local 751 approved Boeing's latest offer by a 59% vote, ending a strike that had put production on hold since mid-September.

Under the new fouryear contract, workers will receive a 38% pay raise through annual wage increases of 13%, 9%, 9%, and 7%, effectively increasing total

wages by 43.65% over the contract's duration. Additional benefits include a \$12,000 ratification bonus and better retirement provisions, such as a 100% company match up to 8% for 401(k) contributions and a guaranteed four percent minimum annual payout under the AMPP incentive plan.

TRUMP WON- WHATS NEXT?

After nearly two years of campaigning for both parties, the 2024 presidential election is finally over. Although votes are still being counted days later, the election was called for Donald Trump earlier than possibly anyone expected. Nearly every poll and aggregator claimed the election was extremely close - Nate Silver, statistician and founder of poll-aggregation site 538, claimed to have run 80,000 simulations on his forecasting model and found the results to be "literally closer than a coin flip" with Harris having a 50.015% chance to win. Journalists and citizens alike bemoaned a possible repeat of the 2000 election, with drawn-out dis-

Nevertheless, the results were clear-and they were as surprising as they were devastating to Democrats. Not only did Trump win the electoral college, including all of the "tipping point" swing states (Wisconsin, Michigan, Pennsylvania, North Carolina, and Georgia), but he beat the odds and took the popular vote as well. Furthermore, nearly every state had a noticeable shift towards the Republican Party in its voter results, with California and New York holding the strongest shift at 12%. No

Both candidates made unique speeches Wednesday touching on their top issues. Kamala Harris' speech focused on the future of American democracy, which was the top polled voting issue for Democrats this election. Harris was sure to point out that "A fundamental principle of American democracy is that when we lose an election, we accept the results." This is no doubt referring to the attack on the Capitol in 2021 spurred on by Trump's insistence that the 2020 election had been stolen.



Though she conceded that America may well be "entering a dark time", Harris reassured voters that "the light of America's promise" would endure.

Trump's speech started out a bit differently. "We have a country that needs help, and it needs help very badly,"

Trump said at a rally Florida Wednesday morning. "We're going to fix our borders, we're going to fix everything about our country." The language leaned wards an image of an America that had been thor-

though Trump claimed "It's time to put the divisions of the past four years behind us," he may not have been referring to anyone on the left at all--in the same speech, he praised Vice President elect JD Vance for voyaging "into the enemy camp" for Vance's interviews

on CNN and MSNBC. It's hard to reconcile a supposed message of unity with this and Trump's vague, often ominous promise to "the purge enemy from within".

So, what's next for America in 2025? The talk-

taken over by foreign, un-American week is Trump's proposed tariffs on entities: "This will forever be rememall foreign goods. The current plan bered as the day the American people is to place tariffs up to 60% on goods regained control of their country." Alimported from China, and a universal

tariff of 10% or more on all other imports. Though tariffs are meant to encourage consumers to buy products made in their home country, America has offloaded so much of its manufacturing that consumers may just have to deal with the increased prices. Many American manufacturers also use parts and materials imported from other countries, so even domestic products will likely see a price increase. Even those who voted for Trump are reportedly feeling uneasy about what this means for their personal finances.

While the economy was the issue that likely pushed Trump over the top in this election, many liberals are more con-

cerned with "Project 2025" a game plan written by some of those closest to Trump's administration that could prove devastating to social and economic progressivism in the United States. Among the proposed policies are a move towards a national ban on abortion, legislation aimed at restricting birth control options, cutting environmental regulations drastically, removing legal protections for all LGBT+ people, dismantling federal programs like Medicare and Medicaid, and even getting rid of the Department of Education altogether. The plan could cripple the working class by destroying America's social safety net, and make the country an extremely dangerous place for women and minorities. And judging from Google search result trends, with "what is Project 2025" spiking after Trump's election, many voters were not informed that this plan even existed.

Ultimately, as with every new administration, we'll have to wait and see which campaign promises are fulfilled, and which were made to be broken.

OPINION: IS TRUE CRIME ETHICAL?

The popularity of true crime media is undeniable, with fans diving into documentaries, podcasts, and articles about real-life cases. True crime gives us insight into criminal psychology, police work, and sometimes even social justice issues. However, the ethics behind turning tragedies into entertainment is a debate that grows louder each year.

As a fan of true crime myself, I get the appeal. These stories are compelling, and there's a strange comfort in feeling like we're learning how to avoid danger or understand the minds of criminals, mostly the latter for me. True crime often sheds light on injustices that might otherwise go ignored. Some stories help reopen cases, bring attention to neglected victims, and remind viewers and listeners of the importance of safety and justice. Shows like Making a Murderer and podcasts like Serial have even impacted real court cases, sometimes leading to retrials or new investigations. In these cases, true crime can serve a purpose beyond just entertainment.

But it's hard to ignore the ethical concerns. Critics argue that true crime media often capitalizes on real people's suffering and loss. Victims and their families may relive painful memories when their loved ones' deaths are discussed in great detail on TV or podcasts. Some critics worry that creators prioritize shocking content over sensitivity, turning real trauma into a

spectacle. Families sometimes report feeling like their loved one has been reduced to an episode, losing the humanity of their story.

The ethics also get murky when creators prioritize entertainment over accuracy. Details are sometimes exaggerated or dramatized for dramatic effect, potentially skewing public perception and creating misunderstandings about the criminal justice system. There's also a risk of misinformation spreading as viewers accept a polished documentary as fact without questioning what's been omitted or changed.

However, some creators are addressing these concerns by striving for a more ethical approach. Podcasts like LA Not So Confidential aim to keep true crime respectful and educational by focusing on psychology and

societal impacts rather than just the "shocking" elements of cases. Other creators are working with the families of victims, donating proceeds to charities, or using their platforms to raise awareness for causes linked to their stories. These efforts show it's possible to present true crime in a way that honors victims rather than exploiting them.

Ultimately, true crime has both risks and benefits. It can educate and expose truths, but it also walks a fine line between storytelling and exploitation. As fans, we can be more thoughtful about the content we support, choosing shows and podcasts that approach stories responsibly and considerately. By supporting ethical creators, fans can enjoy true crime responsibly and ensure that real lives aren't reduced to mere entertainment.

ALBUM REVIEW: EPIC: THE MUSICAL - THE VENGEANCE SAGA

EPIC: The Musical has been slamming the iTunes charts for every released album, skyrocketing to the Number 1 played album on iTunes within a week of release. EPIC: The Vengeance Saga, is no different. The Vengeance Saga is the eighth album of the nine-album concept musical based on Homer's The Odyssey.

EPIC: The Musical, is a concept album that released its first album on December 25, 2022, by now-renowned artist: Jorge Rivera-Herrans. EPIC is based on the Greek Mythological Tale of the Odyssey, where Odysseus, the King of Ithaca, sails back home after the Siege of Troy (popularly known for the Trojan Horse plot). On his way home, he encounters monsters, storms, and even the wrath of Gods, most commonly, Poseidon, the God of the Ocean.

The Vengeance Saga, released on October 31, 2024, takes place where the Greek Mythology tale places Odysseus on the island of the Goddess Calypso, who imprisons and abuses Odysseus for seven long years. Odysseus is then released from this island after Zeus' judgment is decreed. The peak of this album is when he is on the shores of Ithaca, within eyesight of his home that he longed for 20 years when suddenly, Poseidon blocks his path.

Poseidon is unhappy and ultimately condemns Odysseus to death. But, using a bag containing a mighty storm, Odysseus jetpacks off the ocean floor Poseidon pinned him to and begins to fight the God of the Ocean. Using the anger of Odysseus' 600 dead comrades and the rage that Poseidon induced into him for 10 years, he immobilizes the God of Tides by flying at the speed of sound and striking him incessantly, disarming him of his almighty trident.

Odysseus calls for Poseidon to re-

move the storm that now blocks him from returning to Ithaca. When Poseidon refuses, Odysseus uses his trident to stab him repeatedly, and since Gods cannot die, Poseidon only feels the unending pain from each strike. The album ends with Poseidon calling off the storm and taunting Odysseus as he returns home.

The music in this album is jaw-dropping and intense, as Jorge can depict a literal fight between man and God through musical mo-

MOVIE REVIEW: JENNIFER'S BODY

The 2009 horror-comedy Jennifer's Body, written by Diablo Cody and directed by Karyn Kusama, is a film that's evolved into a cult classic, largely because it takes a refreshing, if grim, look at the lives of teenage girls, their friendship dynamics, and the way society tends to objectify them.

When the film was released, its marketing was heavily focused on hypersexualized imagery and promoting lead actress Megan Fox as a sex symbol. This choice of marketing, brought about by men, was ultimately ironic because it clashed with the core themes of the film, which critiques how women are viewed, used, and consumed by society.

In Jennifer's Body, Jennifer (Megan Fox) is a high school "It Girl" who becomes the victim of a ritual sacrifice gone wrong. The ritual, performed by a sleazy indie band, is intended to grant the men fame and success, but it backfires, turning Jennifer into a demonic figure who begins preying on her male classmates. At the center of the film is Jennifer's complex friendship with her best friend, Needy

(Amanda Seyfried), whose loyalty and compassion often clash with Jennifer's self-absorbed and manipulative behavior. Jennifer's sudden, violent transformation serves as both a literal and symbolic depiction of how she's been "devoured" by others, first by the band and then by society.

One of the film's main strengths is how it addresses the objectification of women. Jennifer is initially portrayed as the "Hot Girl" character, an image society has projected onto her. However, her monstrous transformation becomes a powerful metaphor for the toll that objectification takes on women. She literally turns into something that consumes others after being violated and sacrificed for male gain. This transformation underscores a powerful commentary on how society feeds on young women's sexuality, often without their consent or consideration. Jennifer's "monstrosity" isn't so much about being evil as it is about embodying the rage and trauma that come from being reduced to an object.

The film's exploration of Jennifer and Needy's friendship is just as significant. Their relationship is marked by a deep, if twisted, bond that goes beyond the superficial. There's an underlying tension and sense of rivalry that reflects the complexity of female friendships, especially those formed in high school. Needy's love for Jennifer is evident in her willingness to put up with her friend's possessive and sometimes cruel behavior, and Jennifer's manipulation suggests a desire to control Needy while also needing her approval. Their relationship plays out as a blend of admiration, envy, and co-dependence that feels very real and raw, especially against the heightened backdrop of horror. The film suggests that these friendships aren't always simple or purely supportive, they're often layered with conflicting feelings that make them as challenging as they are meaningful.

A big reason Jennifer's Body initially flopped with audiences and critics is that it was marketed almost entirely as a standard teen horror flick, focusing on Megan Fox's sex appeal rather than the film's underlying themes. The marketing campaign, led by male executives, pushed images of Fox in suggestive poses and ignored the film's actual message. Instead of framing Jennifer's Body as a nuanced look at female friendship, power, and rage, it was advertised like a generic slasher movie, meant to excite rather than challenge.

This misrepresentation did more

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than just hurt the movie's box office performance, it also highlighted the very issue the film criticizes: how women, and their stories, are often manipulated and simplified to fit male-dominated narratives. In this sense, the marketing approach unintentionally underscored the film's point about how women's identities are commodified and stripped of com-

Over time, however, audiences have begun to recognize Jennifer's Body for its clever way of remixing common horror tropes and its sharp commentary on girlhood, trauma, and rage. The film has become a feminist horror staple, precisely because it examines these issues in a genre that has historically objectified women. It's now celebrated for its wit, dark humor, and the way it highlights female voices, in the narrative itself, and through the work of Cody and Kusama, who fought to bring an authentically female perspective to a genre where it's often missing.

In the end, Jennifer's Body is more than just a horror movie; it's a critique of the way society treats women, the complexity of female friendships, and the horrors of adolescence. Perhaps ironically, the film's mishandled marketing only serves to reinforce its mes-

TOP TENNIS TALENT LANDS IN SAUDI ARABIA FOR 2024 WTA FINALS

The year's final major Tennis tournament begins on Saturday when the sports highest ranked athletes descend on Riyadh, Saudi Arabia to compete in the 2024 WTA Finals.

Before the winter break, Olympic medalists and Slam champions will vie to win the Billie Jean King and Martina Navratilova trophies, which will be contested by the top eight singles players and top eight doubles couples.

There is also a chance to win a share of the record \$15.25 million prize pool, which is more than any Grand Slam award and has increased by about 70% from the 2023 amount. The singles champion will receive \$5.155 million, while the top doubles team will receive \$1.125 million, if the champions win the event without losing.

Eight days of elite tennis action

In the WTA finals the singles and doubles categories, competitors are split into two groups of four. During the span of the first six days, each singles player or doubles pair will play every other member of their group three times. Both finals are scheduled for November 9th, with the top two in each group competing in the semifinals on November 8th. In the singles competition, the Orange Group has No. 2 Iga Świątek, No. 3 Coco Gauff, No. 6 Jessica Pegula, and No. 8 Barbora Krejčíková, while the Purple Group has No. 1 Aryna Sabalenka, No. 4 Jasmine Paolini, No. 5 Elena Rybakina, and No. 7 Qinwen Zheng.

The United States is represented by

25% of the top eight athletes in both disciplines. The No. 5 US pair Caroline Dolehide and Desirae Krawczyk, as well as Nicole Melichar-Martinez and Taylor Townsend in the Nos. 6 and 8 pairs, are also in the doubles tournament, in addition to Gauff and Pegula on the singles court.

YANKEES LOSING THE WORLD SERIES

The New York Yankees 7-6 defeat to the Los Angeles Dodgers in Game 5 on Wednesday night ended their hopes of pulling off the most improbable of World Series comebacks. It's just a matter of record that the series concluded with the loss in Game 5. Nevertheless, the Yankee's hopes might have been dashed in inning No. 5. As we'll see shortly, the Yankee's numerous errors in Game 5 weren't limited to that inning, but it was that frame that caused the majority of the damage and let the Dodgers avoid having to return to Los Angeles for Game 6 of the series.

Although Yankee supporters may not want to do so, it is necessary to revisit all of those errors, the most of which occurred in that game and series changing fifth inning.

Going into that frame, the Yankees had a commanding 5 - 0 lead, giving them a 94.1% chance of winning Game 5 and extending their comeback from 3 - 0. Ace Gerrit Cole had not yet given up a hit and had been playing like a legend. As the Dodgers leadoff hitter

in the top of the fifth inning, Enrique Hernández immediately recorded that elusive first hit, a single to right. The to reporters following the defeat that ended the season.

Will Smith then gave Anthony Volpe a quick bounce. Hernández was sprinting toward third place in the play,



Yankee's situation really started to go south at that time. The first and only mistake Judge made in 2024 was when he seemed to glance at Hernández on the bases. Hernández managed to get into second place before the throw. "I just didn't make the play," Judge said

while Volpe was trying to get a chance at the front-runner. Hernández would likely receive a force-out for a decent or, frankly, even adequate throw, but Volpe's toss was untrue. Despite being somewhat fresh to third base, Jazz Chisholm Jr. was unable to save him with a nice scoop. The Dodgers had

the bases loaded and no outs when Volpe made a throwing error. What could have been one of the most incredible comebacks in World Series history came to an end as the New

York Yankees lost Game 5 to the Los Angeles Dodgers 7 -6. Although this loss marked the formal conclusion of the series, the real turning point was the fifth inning, which ended their hopes of extending the series. Aaron Judge's crucial error and Anthony Volpe's throwing error were the first of several costly errors that caused the Yankees to lose momentum despite having a commanding 5 - 0 lead. The Dodgers were able to capitalize on these mistakes, loading the bases with no outs and starting a series of events from which the Yankees were unable to recover. Even while it is hard to think about, the Yankees' failure to perform in key situations—especially in the fifth inning—was the final blow to their hopes of winning the

World Series. In high-stakes baseball, when even one mistake may alter the outcome of a game—and a season—the loss serves as a reminder of the thin line separating victory and failure.
