

RENSSELAER PROTESTS PROPOSED SLUDGE INCINERATOR

RESIDENTS AND ACTIVISTS UNITE TO BLOCK CONTROVERSIAL WASTE FACILITY

Rensselaer is currently at the center of a heated debate over a proposed sludge incinerator project that has sparked significant community concern. At a rally held earlier this month, environmentalists, residents, and pol-

iticians voiced their strong opposition to the facility which is set to process sewage sludge and other waste materials. The proposal is brought about by Harbor Rock, a company that dredges, converts, and reuses sediments and waste materials. Critics argue that the plant could have devastating environmental effects, particularly on the nearby Mohawk-Hudson River, a vital water source.

The rally drew large crowds and featured prominent ac-

tivists such as former EPA administrator Judith Enck. Enck stressed the importance of a more thorough environmental review before moving forward. "All of us collectively have spent decades cleaning up this historic river, and just to our south is the old BASF chemical facility, which is highly con-

taminated," said Enck. "It is appalling, appalling that this company wants to build a sludge or sediment incinerator here in the city of Rensselaer, on the BASF property that still has not been cleaned up," Enck continues.

Concerns raised include the potential for toxic leachate (polluted liquid



from decomposing waste) to contaminate local water systems, especially since the region's sewage treatment plants are not equipped to handle such contaminants

Another issue is the facility's location on a floodplain, which raises fears of contamination spilling into the river during floods. Defenders of the project have not fully addressed these concerns, with critics calling for a comprehensive environmental impact statement. This process would allow for more transparency and ensure that the community has a say in the decision-making process

Supporters of the incinerator argue that the project could offer economic benefits, but local activists are not convinced. They claim that the environmental risks far outweigh any potential gains. Many are pushing for alternatives that would protect both the community and the river, which is already burdened by other industrial activities

As the project progresses through the regulation process, its controversy is

far from over. With the support of local groups like Riverkeeper, activists are determined to keep fighting for a more sustainable solution that prioritizes public health and environmental safety.

PRIVATE JET EMISSIONS RASIED

SCIENTISTS ALARMED OVER CARBON DIOXIDE EMISSIONS

A study released Thursday in the journal Nature Communications Earth & Environment found that private airplane carbon dioxide emissions have risen 46% over the past five years.

More than two-thirds of all private jets were stationed in the United States, according to the researchers, who examined over 26,000 aircraft and 18 million

journeys, which represented the majority of private flights between 2019 and 2023. Christopher Jones, head of the CoolClimate Network at UC Berkeley and researcher on carbon footprints, who did not participate in the study, stated, "I think [the paper] is going to be a benchmark for future studies."

"Their research of where individuals are flying is quite fascinating... It's a truly fascinating and thought-provoking paper.The researchers also discovered that a total of 3,800 tons of carbon dioxide were released on 291 flights that were going to the 2023 COP28 climate summit.

The Federal Aviation Administration invented the technology that enables researchers to follow private jets around the turn of the century.

However, the

agency is now permitting aircraft operators to hide their identification, which may prevent comparable studies from being conducted. The results, according to the study's authors, show that more regulation is required, especially because the United States wants

CONT ... PRIVATE greenhouse gas emissions by 2050. However, Jones argues that the issue is ultimately more of a moral concern about wealth inequality than a pressing front on the race to a carbon-neutral society because private aircraft only account for a small por-

tion of total greenhouse gas emissions. The wealthy are disproportionately responsible for air travel emissions. The carbon footprint of a premium class seat is five to nine times that of an economy class seat. Even though they only make up 0.003% of the population, private jets were responsible for over 2% of the industry's emissions. According to Gössling, the worst offenders can use private jet travel alone to pollute 550 times more than the typical person in a single year.

Others have discovered that the

COVID-19 pandemic has been a major factor, since wealthy people have chosen private flights over commercial ones in an attempt to prevent possible exposure to the disease, even though the study did not evaluate the reason for the increase.

WHAT THE ELECTION MEANS FOR THE GLOBAL ECONOMY

WHAT TRUMPS PRESIDENCY MEANS FOR GLOBAL TRADE, MARKETS, AND ECONOMIC POLICIES

Donald Trump's return to the White House has left experts debating the impact his policies might have on the global economy, especially with his focus on tariffs, immigration, and cryptocurrency.

One of Trump's bold promises is to implement significant tariffs on imports, with plans to charge 10-20% on many goods and as high as 60% on Chinese imports. This "America First" strategy has sparked concern, especially in Europe. Thilo Brodtmann of the German Mechanical Engineering Industry Association noted that these tariffs "would strain global trade" and hurt German industries reliant on exports.

Trump's stance on immigration also brings questions. With a focus on deporting undocumented workers, he aims to open up more jobs for American workers. However, analysts warn that rapid deportations could disrupt industries relying heavily on immigrant labor, from agriculture to manufacturing.

Stock markets have reacted strongly, reflecting both optimism and caution. In the U.S., the S&P 500 and Dow Jones saw record jumps after the election, signaling positive reactions to Trump's business-friendly outlook. Yet, the 10-year U.S. Treasury yield rose, indicating concerns about rising government debt due to potential tax cuts and spending hikes.

Trump's support for cryptocurrency is also making waves. Bitcoin hit an all-time high as Trump promised to make

the U.S. the "crypto capital of the planet." His hands-off approach appeals to advocates in the crypto space, giving them hope for fewer regulations.

Global reactions vary, with particular concern in Mexico, whose peso dropped in value. Tariffs and immigration policies are expected to challenge Mexico as it navigates its trading partnership with the U.S.

The coming months will reveal the real impacts of Trump's economic plans, but it's already clear that his policies could have wide-reaching effects, from shifting trade dynamics to influencing cryptocurrency regulation. While markets and experts react with both optimism and caution, businesses worldwide are bracing for changes that could reshape global economic patterns in profound ways.



Artist Megan Suttle's latest exhibition, Once More, is now on display at the Teaching Gallery on Hudson Valley's Campus. Suttles is the founder of Hot Wood Arts, a place that provides studio space for 17 artists working within different types of art media. Those include fine art, music and writing, and stage set design. The exhibit features a mix of video and sculpture to explore themes of physical existence, sense of self, and healing. The title of the exhibit refers to Suttle's series of images that show her contorting her body as an attempt to occupy smaller and smaller open cubes. When

the mandated 2020 COVID quarantine appeared, Suttles revisited the old project and expanded on it. In the end, the series totals 1,000 still images with the artist inside various cube sizes that range from 6, 5, 4, 3, and 2 feet!

The series of images from the cubes, videos, and other works are going to be a part of this exhibit. Subtle considers the installations at the site to be "spatial drawings," due to the combination of video and 3-D elements that utilize her own body to create her overarching message of physical existence.

The Teaching Gallery is open to see the exhibit during the following times: Tuesday from 10 am. to 4 pm.; Thurs-



day and Friday from 1pm to 7pm.; Wednesday from 12pm to 4pm. The gallery is closed on Saturday, Sunday, and Monday. The exhibit closes December 7, and admission is free.

FLOODING IN SPAIN SPARKS OUTRAGE

THE ALLEGED MISHANDLING OF VALENCIA FLOODS

On the night of October 29, Valencia, Spain was impacted by a large flood that affected the great city unexpectedly. Afterward, tens of thousands of Spaniards protested for the Valencia President, Carlos Mazón, to resign after failing to warn the citizens of Valencia of the incoming flood. The flood left nearly 200 dead, and more missing.

The tens of thousands of protestors marched to the city hall of Valencia with signs, demanding that the president resign and other signs that read "You Killed Us!". The president stated that he "respected" the march and the practice of the right to protest. President Mazón was also under

pressure due to the slow response to the aftermath of the flooding, having thousands of volunteers be the 'first boots on the ground', and only days later did government officials mobilize enforcement officers to help with the matter.



Mazón argues that his administration was just as in the dark as the people of Valencia and that the magnitude of the natural disaster was 'unforeseeable', so they did not receive the proper warnings from central authorities. However, it was reported that on the morning of October 29, red alert warnings were sent throughout Spain. At 6 PM, the flooding started, with thousands of people unaware. It wasn't until 8 PM that Mazón sent warnings to his citizens' cell phones.

Outraged, the people demanded that Mazón step down as president, as he left his citizens unwarned and helpless in this effort. The citizens claimed: "They should have sent in the army earlier. The king should have made them send it in. Why do we want him as a symbolic figure? He is worthless. The people are alone. They have abandoned us." Thousands of people are mourning the loss of loved ones, and recovering from their land and homes being demolished.

EFFECTS OF SOUTHERN NEW YORK WILDFIRES SEEN IN THE **CAPITAL DISTRICT** EVERYTHING YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT THESE FIRES

Over the past week, the air outside has been eerily reminiscent of last year's spring Canadian wildfires. But unlike last year, the smoke this time around comes from a more localized area. Wildfires in Jennings Creek and Sterling State Park located right outside of the Catskills have been raging on for days, with the smoke traveling all the way up to cover the majority of the capital region.

The blaze, which is split between New York and New Jersey, has required over 250 first responders from over 40 different fire companies to fight. The affected area is over 5,000 acres, which makes it the worst New York wildfire since 2008.

These fires are believed to have been started due to the drought con-



ditions in the area, as it had not seen rain in 15 days, and the recent falling dead leaves. This combo allowed a series of small fires to quickly turn

out of control. These conditions have also prompted New York state governor Kathy Hochul to put a burn ban in effect for the state until November 30.

But thankfully it looks like the worst of the fires are behind us, as crews are slowly starting to gain the upperhand in controlling the historic blaze. This hopefully means that the air in the capital district should also clear up, as during the height of the wildfires the area was seeing Air Quality Index (AQI) numbers of over 100. Numbers this high are listed as "unhealthy for sensitive groups", but

ELISE STEFANIK POTENTIALLY CHOSEN FOR TRUMP'S UN **AMBASSADOR**

Elise Stefanik, a Republican representative from New York, has recently been selected by former President Donald Trump to serve as the U.S. Ambassador to the United Nations. This move has sparked both excitement and criticism from various political circles, marking a significant shift in Stefanik's political career.

Stefanik, who has represented New York's 21st Congressional District since 2015, has been a key figure in Republican politics for quite some time now. Some residents express pride in her rising profile, believing her representation at the U.N. could further elevate the region's political status. THE FUTURE OF REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH IN THE USA

The landscape of reproductive health in the United States has entered an era of uncertainty marked by evolving state laws, especially the 2024 election. In the case of Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization that overturned Roe v. Wade, many states have held referendums and voted on issues concerning abortion access. Referendums are "a general vote/popular vote by the electorate on a single political question that has been referred to them for direct decision." Due to the overturning of Roe v. Wade, individual states were now

allowed to decide how they wanted to regulate their abortion laws through those referendums. These polls have revealed deep division throughout the nation, with some states expanding abortion rights, while others imposing stricter limitations.

Now what does this mean for IVFs (In Vitro Fertilization)? An IVF is a fertility treatment in which an egg is fertilized outside the body and implanted into the uterus as a treatment for those struggling with infertility. However, lawyers are skeptical of some of the abortion laws coming into place and how they may affect IVF, even if they make no mention of IVF. But due to the definition, it may be an issue. For example, Arkansas' abortion ban defines an unborn child as something starting at fertilization. So if a law is written that establishes a fertilized egg or embryo as a person, discarding the embryo would be considered a violation of that law, and maybe homicide. Though it is unclear, the law focuses heavily on small details so this may affect IVFs.

As a response to the continuing restrictions on reproductive health, a new movement called the 4B movement has been growing in popularity. The name stands for "Body, Birth, Boundaries, and Beliefs", which emphasize a woman's right to control her own reproductive health due to those

4B's. In a way, the 4B movement is an effort to reclaim bodily autonomy by those who feel differently about the way the abortion laws have been swinging.

With the election of 2024 ending in Donald Trump's victory, there is a possibility that Trump will undergo Project 2025. Though Trump has said "I haven't read it. I don't want to read it - purposefully," speculation still exists as to Trump's beliefs on the matter. Under that project, there is a potential for a national abortion ban. If this ban were enacted, it's likely that efforts to aid coverage with birth control would be reduced. As a result, there would be higher costs for contraception and limit the accessibility of birth control.


to the Joker of the comic books, but the second movdeconstructs that notion, Joker and Harley (or Lee as the movie calls her) barely showcase attributes similar to the characters they are based on, which may leave the general audience disinterest-

The Joker has a character study done on him yet again, but not as extensively or as interestingly its predecessor. The first film built him up to wear his

makeup, to become the Joker. Folie à Deux takes that makeup off. It essentially brings the character down to where he had been at the beginning of the first movie.

The first film had clear and interesting commentary, and this sequel also aims to provide commentary, but not so much on the character(s) of the movie or the societal themes of the film, but more so on the audience that enjoyed and related to the first film. The reality is, for better or for worse, many individuals found something to relate to with the main character, and when that pivotal character is so brutally torn down on screen, it makes it a particularly difficult watch for those individuals. It's almost as if the director, Todd Phillips, wanted to undo what he had built up from his first movie. Generally, as this sequel deconstructs the first film, it leaves lovers of the first film dissatisfied. This isn't helped by the fact that the movie ends on a dreary note.

Perhaps as a standalone, Joker: Folie à Deux would have been better received. However, since it is a sequel to a well-liked film, comparisons come naturally; and when it fails to live up to expectations, whether that be the folly of the filmmakers or the audience, it fails to receive the desired reception. I wouldn't consider Joker: Folie à Deux an entirely bad movie, but labeling it as disappointing seems appropriate.



Youth sports have become a significant part of many children's lives. These opportunities don't just offer physical exercise, but opportunities for personal growth and development. However, in recent years, youth sports have become increasingly inaccessible to families with limited financial means. What was once a simple extracurricular activity has turned into a financial burden for many, with costs steadily increasing for participation, uniforms, equipment, and travel. This pay-to-play system threatens to leave behind a large portion of youth who are unable to afford these opportunities, and it's time to consider how we can make sports more accessible to all children, regardless of their family's income.

The financial barriers are significant. For example, in some cases, the costs for a single season of sports can easily exceed \$1,000, and that doesn't

even include the price of travel for games or tournaments. A recent article from The New York Times highlights that youth sports have evolved into an expensive enterprise, with families often shelling out thousands of dollars a year. Sports organizations have become profit-driven, prioritizing elite, competitive leagues over recreational opportunities. For many families, these expenses are simply too much to bear, which means children miss out on activities that could foster teamwork, discipline, and resilience.

The growing financial burden has created a system where only children from higher-income families can participate in top-tier sports programs, which has much wider implications. Children from lower-income households may miss out on opportunities to be active, develop important social skills, and learn the value of working toward a goal. Sports are about more than just winning, they teach valuable life lessons that can shape children into well-rounded individuals. When participation is restricted to only those who can afford it, we lose out on nurturing potential in young people from all walks of life.

What's also concerning is how this pay-to-play culture has altered the focus of youth sports. For parents or coaches, it's easy to see that the emphasis has shifted from fun, inclusive recreation to a win-at-all-costs mentality. Leagues are more competitive than ever, and the pressure on children to succeed can be overwhelming. Sports should be about fostering a love for the game and encouraging personal growth, not about pushing children to perform at an elite level before they even reach their teens. With so many children unable to participate due to cost, the joy of playing becomes something that only a select few experience.

So, what can be done to address this problem? First, we must recognize that youth sports should be a right, not a privilege. Local governments, schools, and nonprofit organizations can help reduce costs for families who cannot afford the high fees. Community-based programs that emphasize participation over competition can offer children a chance to experience sports in a less

financially demanding way. There are already some great initiatives aimed at providing free or low-cost sports opportunities, but these efforts need to be expanded and supported on a larg-

Sports organizations and businesses involved in youth sports need to rethink their priorities. Reducing fees for participation, offering scholarships, or creating sliding scales for families based on income can help make these opportunities more accessible. We need to shift the focus back to inclusivity and fun, rather than turning every league into an exclusive, expensive, elite-level competition.

Youth sports have the potential to provide valuable experiences that shape children into confident, capable adults. JOEY LOGANO WINS 3RD NASCAR CHAMPIONSHIP
