Hurricane Erin Slams Seaside Heights, NJ

Rip Current Claims Local Swimmer

The Jersey Shore was hit again, as Hurricane Erin came crashing through the coast late Sunday August 24th. The storm brought heavy rain, winds, and major flooding. The Category 2 storm made landfall near Seaside Heights just after midnight, with the wind gusts scaring both tourists and locals alike.

Boardwalk businesses now face some damage that will have to be fixed, but luckily, it is nothing compared to Superstorm Sandy in 2012. Iconic attractions, including arcades and food stands along the Seaside Heights boardwalk, were hit and flooded by storm surge. Local officials estimate that repairs could take months, but the community is strong and ready to take on the challenge.

Emergency crews worked overnight to rescue stranded families and restore power to the homes affected. On Monday, part of Seaside Heights lost power, and officials urged the out-of-town residents to avoid returning until roads are cleared.

Those warnings proved especially urgent when tragedy struck on August 11. A 31-year-old man from Trenton lost his life after being swept into a rip

current, just hours after lifeguards had left for the day. First responders were able to rescue four others, which included his 16-year-old son, but despite immediate CPR efforts, the 31 year old man was pronounced dead at Commu



nity Medical Center in Toms River. Officials urged swimmers to never fight a rip current but instead swim parallel to the shore until free from its pull or until rescue teams can save you. Or an even better idea, just stay out of the ocean when the red flags are flying.

EU Fines Google 2.95B

Trump claps back... tariffs and trade redistribution threats...

On September 5th, the European Commission fined Google a lump sum of €2.95B- the result of the tech company allegedly distorting the market for online ads.

The European Commission is the executive arm of the European Union (EU), responsible for proposing policies and laws, managing budget, and implementing important decisions. Overall, the purpose of them is to represent the EU to the public, on an international and political level.

Accusations against Google were based on distorting the market of online advertisement, by favoring its own services, which is ultimately detrimental to other competitors, advertisers and online publishers. The company owns various parts of the digital ad system, which is considered a major conflict of interest. Google has ownership of software that is used by publishers and advertisers when they are purchasing online ads.

The fine was originally intended to be delivered on Monday, September 1st, however Maroš Šefčovič intervened amidst the tariff threats from

President Trump. The White House has now used the threat of trade redistribution and tariffs to foreign countries and institutions since Trump's return in January to the office.

Trump's clap back at the EU and European Commission has resulted in Google now having 60 days to report back on how they plan on remedying the situation. In early November, there will be a hearing and assessment of Google's proposal, which will then determine further actions.

"In 2023, the Commission issued a charge sheet to Google in which it concluded that a mandatory divestment by the internet search behemoth of part of its adtech operations might be the only way to effectively prevent the firm from favoring its own services in the future," says Jacob Perry on the topic for Politico news. The charge sheet issued to Google is a formal document laying out the allegations against them.

The Commission's multibillion-euro fine falls slightly short of the €4.34 bil-

lion fine the EU executive gave to Google in 2018 over abuse of dominance related to Android mobile devices, but still is higher than the €2.42 billion fine the firm faced for favoring its own comparison-shopping service in 2017.

In short, many different resources are revealing that one of the few long term solutions to the tech company's self preferencing is to break up different parts of its business/ownership.

FAMINE STRIKES... SPREADING IN GAZA

Famine, according to the United Nations, is classified when a populace faces a combination of widespread malnutrition, deaths from starvation, and the spread of disease due to a lack of access to food. Famine can be statistically defined by meeting various conditions. These conditions include: twenty percent or more households have a severe lack of food, thirty percent of children under the age of five are facing malnourishment, and at least two out of ten thousand people are dying due to starvation or the combination of malnutrition and illness. Famine can be caused by three man-made or nature-driven factors, including warfare, drastic climate conditions, and economic decline.

The Integrated Food Security Phase Classification system, otherwise known as the IPC, measures the degree of food security in various phases, with famine being placed at Phase 5. The IPC is the international standard for classifying acute food insecurity, with its primary usage being the prediction or confirmation of famine in a given country. International agencies and allied governments formally declare famines, not the IPC, as it is more of a tool or guide rather than a governing body. Humanitarian partners with volunteers working in malnourished cities report back to the international community, allowing them to conclude the status of the given circumstances.


The first modern famine in the Middle East was declared on August 22nd, 2025. With two years of severe conflict, repeated dislocations, and major restrictions on humanitarian aid, the Gaza Strip was officially declared to be under a severe hunger crisis.

The current conditions in the Gaza Strip have severely impeded access to essential resources such as food, water, and medical aid, pushing the population into mass starvation.

Famine conditions are expected to spread from the Gaza Strip to the cities

of Deir Al Balah and Khan Younis later this week.

Regeneron Donates \$500,000 to **Hudson Valley Community College** to Strengthen STEM

Regeneron Pharmaceuticals is a leading biotechnology company that is based out of Tarrytown, New York, and has many other research and manufacturing branches across the country, and multiple worldwide partnerships. Regeneron's main purpose is developing and manufacturing different biologic medicines. You may not think that you know much about Regeneron, but it is likely that you have heard of some of their biologics, most likely from television medication commercials. Their groundbreaking drug therapies, like Eylea for eye diseases and Dupixent for inflammatory diseases are seen in widely seen commercials played on most tv networks.

The Capital Region Regeneron, a part of the larger global company, recently donated \$500,000 to Hudson Valley Community College. The donation was intended for Hudson Valley to expand their STEM department, which includes science, technology, engineering, and math. Hudson Valley is honored to receive such a large grant for their STEM departments, and has already begun plans to create a Regeneron Biotechnology Lab, and the Applied Technology Education Center (ATEC). Regeneron has also stated that they plan on providing hands-on biotechnology opportunities for local high school students and college students.

Regeneron is dedicated to supporting education in STEM, and this grant will provide exactly that. Students will get hands-on experience that contributes to both learning and generating life long passion for science. Students will now have more support to dive into the subjects that interest them, and also have more opportunities to try new things, outside of what is currently offered at HVCC. Most importantly, students will have chances to make mistakes, try alternatives, and immerse themselves in many different aspects of biotechnology.

Anthropic Backs California Bill That Could Test Newsom on Al

hind AIs, Anthropic, has publicly Newsom. declared support for California's Senate Bill 53. This bill was put into writing by State Senator Scott Wiener, set to regulate AIs. The bill pits Anthropic against other leading technology giants and interest bodies who have been opposing the bill with much determination. SB 53, the Transparency in Frontier Artificial Intelligence Act, is a bill mandating major producers of AIs to make public safety designs and transparency reports before putting newly developed models into use. It attempts to prevent "catastrophic risks," such as the use of AI in biowarfare manufacturing or cyberattacks. It's a narrower bill than previously more stringent bills,

> Anthropic's support is being described as a "rare victory" for Senator Wiener and a "healthy template for the regulation of AI" where no federal regulations exist. Proponents of the bill believe it successfully transforms voluntary safety pledges into legally binding safety requirements, guaranteeing accountability and safety for everyone. Some opponents of the bill, including industry leader OpenAI, believe state-level regulation could inhibit innovation and bring differential norms inconsistent with those developed for home markets in the longer run, playing to foreign competition's advantage.

> > An earlier version of the bill was already passed in the California Senate and needs a final vote before it goes to the desk of Gov. Newsom. His position on SB 53 will garner a lot of attention as it would establish precedent nationwide for regulations for Artificial Intelligence.

Cellphone Bans In Shools

In 2023, Florida became the first state to announce a plan to ban cellphones in schools statewide during school hours. Other states soon followed suit, until a total of fourteen states had banned cellphones in school, and several others enacted laws to regulate the amount of time students spend on their phones during the school day. In May of 2024, New York joined these ranks, and in September of this year, the statewide ban on cellphones in schools came into effect.

This school year, students will not have access to their cellphones during the school day, which includes lunch and breaks as well as class time. The intention of this ban is to remove the distractions cellphones and other devices present, to take a step back from the digital world, and, in doing so, improve students' academic performance and encourage students to engage with each other during break times rather than spend that time on a device.

While it is still early in the school year, most teachers seem to be supportive of this ban. They hope that students will be more focused and engage more in learning the material during class. Teachers also hope that the regulations on cell phone usage will help students spend less time on social media and decrease cyberbullying.

Student opinon seems to lean in the opposite direction. A few students seem happy with the ban, enjoying the opportunities to engage face-to-face with friends, have less of a distraction during class, and even just having a reason to stay off their phones. However, most students don't agree that banning phones is a good idea. They argue that cellphones can be useful resources and students should have access to phones for entertainment during breaks. One of the most common concerns for those who disagree with the phone ban is safety; students want to have access to their cellphones

in case of an emergency.



The album is still so popular that on December 16th, 2024, J. Cole played a sold out, one night only show at Madison Square Garden to celebrate the tenth anniversary of the album.




Minnesota Vikings' Create an Internet Sensation:
